Christmas - the feast of Emmanuel.

Christmas 2012 comes to us as we continue to navigate our way through austere times. Hopefully you are managing to do it without too much difficulty. Once again we are invited at the darkest time of the year to step out of the shadow and reach into the light. It is a time of reappraisal of personal, family and community values in the light of the One who came as the Christ Child of Bethlehem to bring us Good News. Every Christmas is a reliving of that event which changed human history. Each Christmas is an invitation to walk in the light of Christ and to view our neighbours in that light. It is essentially a family feast, an occasion for exchanging gifts and sharing the warmth of our homes in the company of our friends. It is important that we take time to celebrate what we have and to give thanks for those who are dear to us.

For some, this may be the happiest Christmas of your lives; the first Christmas in your new home or perhaps with your new baby or maybe just together. For others, it may be a sad Christmas filled with the memories of a loved one who died during the course of the year. For some it may be the first time in years that all the family managed to make it home. For others, it may be the very opposite experience. For some families it will surely mean the excitement of Santa Claus and for others it will mean trips to hospitals or nursing homes to visit family members. But whatever our Christmas experience, let us remember that behind it all, is the presence among us of one who came into our world as a fragile baby. Someone who came to bring a message of love and peace. Someone who came to tell us how we should live and the kind of people we should be, and above all, someone who became a member of each one of our families.

Christmas always comes to us with a hint of new beginnings.
