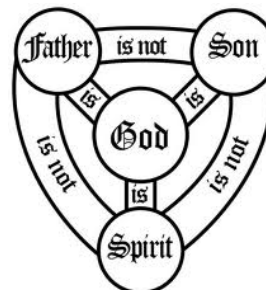
Trocaire

Feast of the Holy Trinity, also called Trinity Sunday, Christian feast in honour of the Trinity, celebrated in Western liturgical churches on the Sunday following Pentecost (the 50th day after Easter). It is known that the feast was celebrated on this day from as early as the 10th century.



Trinity Sunday celebrates the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, the three Persons of God:

the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

The Thursday after Trinity Sunday is observed as the Feast of Corpus Christi. In some countries including Ireland it is celebrated on the following Sunday.

His research focus includes an understanding of illness of mind and brain as a disorder of the nerve network, and in the emerging field of neuro-education - the brain science of learning, which arose from his long-standing interest in education.

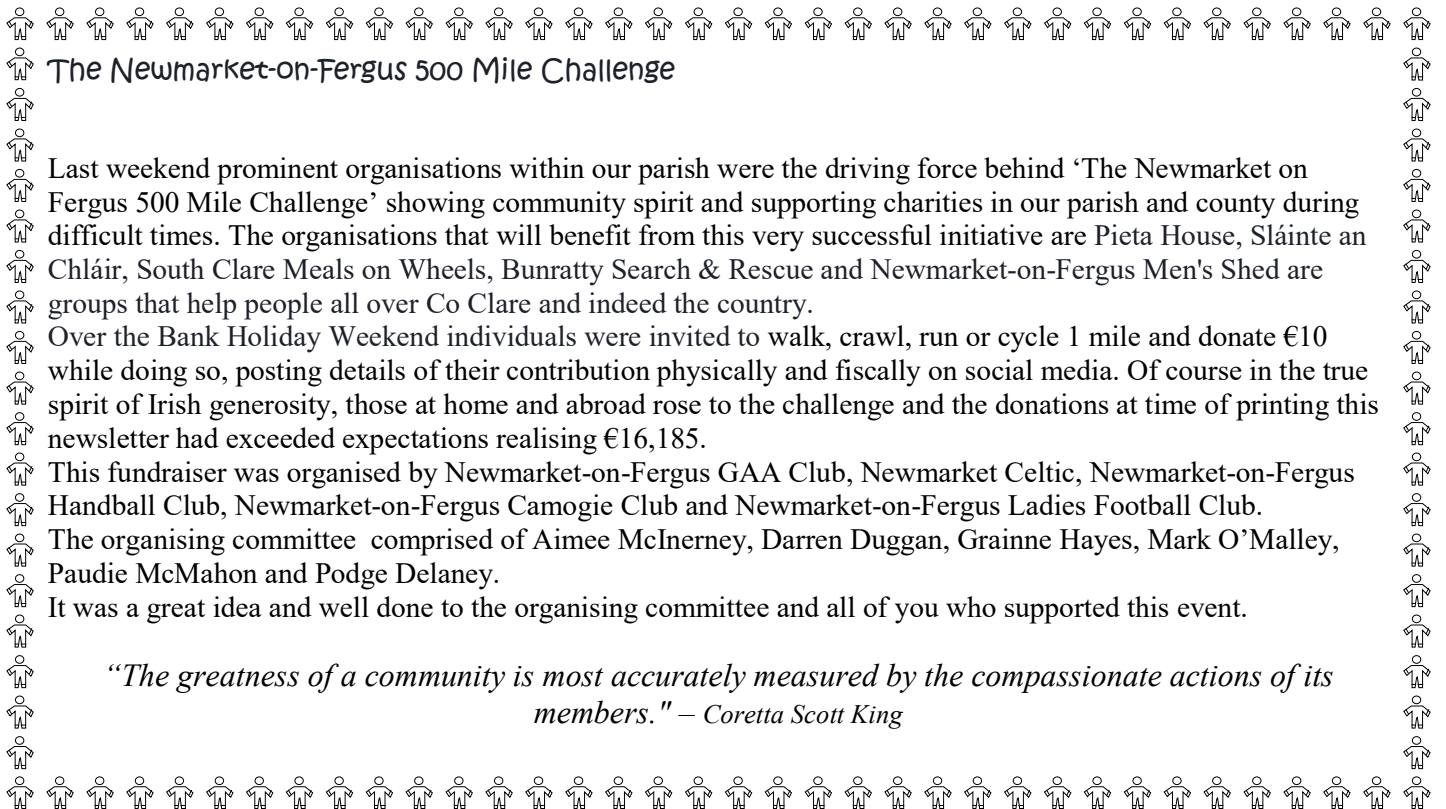
Prayer to St Anthony
